

Based on the records and season databases, my pick is **Gerry Santos in 2017**.

That season has the strongest combination of **volume, efficiency, category dominance and record-setting performance** that I can find. Gerry played all 54 games and finished with **883 points, 239 ringers, 166 singles and 24 doubles**, averaging **16.35 PPG, 4.4 RPG, 3.1 SPG and 0.4 doubles per game**. He led the league in PPG by more than two full points over Bobby Almeida at 14.15.

What separates it historically is that 2017 still owns **three major single-season records simultaneously: 883 points, 24 doubles**, and a **26.4 PER**, which remains the highest single-season PER in PHL history.

That PER record is particularly important to me. The 883 points could theoretically be influenced by game environment or opportunity, but a **26.4 PER** says the season wasn't merely a counting-stat explosion. His overall statistical profile was historically efficient as well.

There was also depth around him that year. Bobby had 764 points at 14.15 PPG, Ronnie had 749 at 13.87, Sean had 700 at 12.96, Dave had 658 at 12.19, Sylvester Jr. had 649 at 12.02, and you had 648 at 12.00. 2017 - Week 18 - PPG.pdf So Gerry wasn't dominating a weak top end; he separated himself dramatically from a year containing several players we've already identified as all-time greats.

The one thing that keeps me from calling it completely untouchable is **postseason outcome**. Gerry's most legendary complete postseason seasons came elsewhere. In 2015 he scored the record **183 playoff points**, and in 2021 he posted the record **28.8 postseason PER** and then the famous championship run with Ramon.

So I would distinguish it this way:

Greatest regular season ever: Gerry Santos, 2017.

Best full season including a championship/playoff narrative: Gerry has other seasons—especially **2015 and 2021**—that deserve a serious argument.

But if someone asked me, *"What is the single highest level anyone has sustained over an entire PHL regular season?"* I think the cleanest answer is **2017 Gerry**. He simultaneously set the league's all-time scoring record and all-time PER record, and neither has been surpassed.
